WINNER IN ARCHITECTURAL DESIGN - RESTORATION & RENOVATION

The original building had a mossy interior and disordered vertical communication. In this matter, the intervention prioritizes the order in the interior and on the facade. Stairs are connected in a communication room in one side of the building. This benefits the reorganization of the rooms and gives each plan more unity and light. The floor plan contains the elements that are reminiscent of the fact that it was a blacksmith's shop. First floor, second floor and roof are combined to create a comfortable and contemporary house that is spatially without withdrawing from its historical character.

The Little Building, built in 1917, is now a cornerstone of Emerson College's downtown campus. After 100 years, the school needed to make critical repairs to the building's structure and façade while adding residential capacity. Through a hybrid preservation/restoration process, designers reimagined the historic structure, painstakingly recreating the façade on upper levels, preserving the cast stone where possible, and updating its efficiency and structural integrity.

WINNER IN ARCHITECTURAL DESIGN - RESTORATION & RENOVATION

By adding a transparent, immaterial and structural layer to the Grand Théâtre de Québec, this innovative solution protects and preserves the building's two defining components: its brutalist architecture and sculptural mural. The complex, delicate rescue operation maintains the continuity of the original design narrative, with the thin glass making its brutalist lines and artistic statement even more striking. Depending on the light, it reflects the city or showcases the theatre. A sensitive response to a complex problem, this advance from the Lemay/Atelier 21 team is a North American first.
